ST. FRANCIS OF ASSISI (1182-1226)

St. Francis was born in Assisi, Italy in 1182. His feast day is October 4th and he is the founder of all Franciscan orders and the patron saint of animals, merchants and ecology. His father, Pietro, a wealthy clothing merchant, was away in France when Francis was born and upon returning, was furious to learn held been baptized Giovanni after John the Baptist so pietro had him renamed Francis in honor of his infatuation with France. Francis grew up enjoying a very easy lifestyle because of his father's wealth and was easygoing, charming and loved by all. However, he hung with a wild crowd accustomed to vice and evil and even said "I lived in sin" during that time. But Francis wanted more - more than wealth - he wanted to be a noble, a knight and win glory in battle and got his chance when Assisi declared war on Perugia. He was taken prisoner and jailed in a dark dungeon for a year and still never lost his happy manner. He tried again in the Fourth Crusade in a full suit of golden armor riding on his horse and got only one day's ride when God told him in a dream to return. He did so in humiliation and was called a coward by the village and raged at by his father for the wasted money on his armor. Francis, conversion didn't happen overnight and he began to pray more over time and weep for his sins. God knew Francis' love of beauty and tested him with a smelly leper of whose hand Francis kissed and then the leper miraculously disappeared. Francis then went to the ancient church of San Damiano and heard Christ say "Francis repair my church". He took it literally and sold his dad's fabric to do so incensing his father. His dad dragged him in front of the bishop who told Francis to give the money back and God would provide. Francis gave up the clothes off his back, disowned his father and realized God meant him to repair the church spiritually. His companions came from all walks of life and Francis's simple rule was for them to live the Gospel - sell what they had - give to the poor - take nothing on their journey and especially take up the cross daily. Francis loved animals and vice-versa because they were God's creation. One story had him talk to a wolf who was eating humans and not only did the wolf stop - he became the townspeople's pet. Francis found true freedom in possessing nothing but God's love and wanting to share that love with the world. In 10 years his brotherhood grew to 5,000 men. Years of poverty and wandering made Francis ill and his final years were filled with intense suffering (including blindness) and humiliation. In praying to share in Christ's passion ne received the stigmata. He died welcoming his Sister Death, while the Passion of Jesus was read aloud from the Gospel on October 3rd, 1226. How thankful we should all be for this remarkable saint and for God's goodness!
