READING I - Gn 15:5-12, 17-18

The Lord God took Abram outside and said, "Look up at the sky and count the stars, if you can. Just so," he added, "shall your descendants

if you can. Just so," he added, "shall your descendants be." Abram put his faith in the LORD, who credited it to him as an act of righteousness.

He then said to him, "I am the LORD who brought you from Ur of the Chaldeans to give you this land as a possession." "O Lord GOD," he asked, "how am I to know that I shall possess it?" He answered him, "Bring me a three-year-old heifer, a three-year-old she-goat, a three-year-old ram, a turtledove, and a young pigeon." Abram brought him all these, split them in two,

and placed each half opposite the other; but the birds he did not cut up. Birds of prey swooped down on the carcasses, but Abram stayed with them. As the sun was about to set, a trance fell upon Abram, and a deep, terrifying darkness enveloped him. It was on that occasion that the LORD made a covenant with Abram, saying: "To your descendants I give this land, from the Wadi of Egypt to the Great River, the Euphrates."

A GIFT OF SELF THE GREATEST GIFT

All the books about parenting - being a successful, effective parent - agree on one common point: Nothing replaces the gift of self to your child. A gift of self expressed in attention, listening with the heart as well as with one's ears, sharing time/sports/jokes/discoveries, going to church together, praying with and hearing a child's prayers.

But giving of self is no easy task in today's world. Most often, both parents have jobs outside the home, and there are simply so many things to do when people are at home. Just the work - cleaning, repairing, maintaining involved in making a house a home can consume large chunks of time. There are so many others: shopping, social life (visiting with friends and their children), finding time to relax, catching up on television, or just finding a chance to read the newspaper.

The ways of growing in our relationship with God are as varied as there are individuals. Nearly everyone needs to check a daily schedule. Mark off 15 minutes for "God and me" time together. Mental prayer, spiritual reading, or just rejoicing in God's holy presence by resting in the Lord. For our freedom to be with and enjoy others will come from the freedom of coming closer to God. In that freedom, we will find ways to please those we love children, parents, friends.
