ST. PATRICK, (c.389-461)

"Following the advice of one's soul friend."

His feast day is March 17. At the age of sixteen Patrick, the son of a Roman-Celtic family living in Britain, was kidnapped by Irish pirates and brought to Ireland and held as a slave. During that time he had visions on which an angel or helping spirit, whom he called Victor, appeared to comfort him. In fact Victor was part of a strong tradition in Celtic spirituality, going back into pre-Christian times; the practice of having a soul friend. Victor was Patrick's soul friend, a person either alive in body, deceased and appearing in spirit, an angelic being, or even a friendly animal. A soul friend encourages and advises you on the most important matters of your spiritual life. It was the advice of Victor that Patrick made his most important decisions. He would escape from slavery, return home, to become a priest and return to Ireland again. There he taught the people and organized the communities, through his influence, Ireland would become one of the most Christian and eventually Roman Catholic countries in western Europe. His prayer, Patrick, teach me to Know and trust the angelic and heavenly friendship that is all around me. If I do not know my guardian spirits, help me to discover them. If I do, show me how to deepen my relationship with them and listen to their wise advice about leading a spiritual life and living with God. Amen.

ST. JOSEPH, First Century, Husband of Mary

His feast day is March 19. Patron of Fathers, Protector of Homes, Carpenters and a Happy Death. Joseph was the husband of Mary and the foster father of Jesus. He was from the royal house of David and grew up in Bethlehem. At some point, he moved to Galilee where he was a builder. He was attuned to heavenly influence and divine messages, particularly as they came in dreams. He was told by an angel not to reject Mary when he discovered that she was pregnant. Joseph had considerable influence in molding Jesus' character, since in the custom of the times, sons worked alongside their fathers, and Joseph was known to be a just man. His prayer, Joseph, give me the perseverance to work diligently at my trade or career, and to provide for myself and loved ones. Even when hard times occur and it is easy to become discouraged, help me to work hard. Also teach me how to be happy with a modest living and not hunger for great wealth that could easily prevent me from enjoying the simple things of life. Amen.
