READING I - 1 Jos 5:9a, 10-12 The LORD said to Joshua, "Today I have removed the reproach of Egypt from you."

While the Israelites were encamped at Gilgal on the plains of Jericho, they celebrated the Passover on the evening of the fourteenth of the month. READING 2 - 2 Cor 5:17-21

Brothers and sisters: Whoever is in Christ is a new creation: the old things have passed away; behold, new things have come. And all this is from God, who has reconciled us to himself through Christ and given us the ministry of reconciliation, namely, God was reconciling the world to himself in Christ, not counting their trespasses against them and entrusting to us the message of reconciliation. So we are ambassadors for Christ, as if God were appealing through us. We implore you on behalf of Christ, be reconciled to God. For our sake he made him to be sin who did not know sin, so that we might become the righteousness of God in him.

GOSPEL - Luke 15:1-3, 11-32

Tax collectors and sinners were all drawing near to listen to Jesus, but the Pharisees and scribes began to complain, saying, "This man welcomes sinners and eats with them." So to them Jesus addressed this parable: "A man had two sons, and the younger son said to his father, 'Father give me the share of your estate that should come to me.' So the father divided the property between them. After a few days, the younger son collected all his belongings and set off to a distant country where he squandered his inheritance on a life of dissipation. When he had freely spent everything, a severe famine struck that country, and he found himself in dire need. So he hired himself out to one of the local citizens who sent him to his farm to tend the swine. And he longed to eat his fill of the pods on which the swine fed, but nobody gave him any. Coming to his senses he thought, 'How many of my father's hired workers have more than enough food to eat, but here am I, dving from hunger. I shall get up and go to my father and I shall say to him, "Father, I have sinned against heaven and against you. I no longer deserve to be called your son; treat me as you would treat one of your hired workers."" So he got up and went back to his father. While he was still a long way off, his father caught sight of him, and was filled with compassion. He ran to his son, embraced him and kissed him. His son said to him, 'Father, I have sinned against heaven and against you; I no longer deserve to be called your son.' But his father ordered his servants, 'Quickly bring the finest robe and put it on him; put a ring on his finger and sandals on his feet. Take the fattened calf and slaughter it. Then let us celebrate with a feast, because this son of mine was dead, and has come to life again; he was lost, and has been found.' Then the celebration began. Now the older son had been out in the field and, on his way back, as he neared the house, he heard the sound of music and dancing. He called one of the servants and asked what this might mean. The servant said to him, 'Your brother has returned and your father has slaughtered the fattened calf because he has him back safe and sound.' He became angry, and when he refused to enter the house, his father came out and pleaded with him. He said to his father in reply, 'Look, all these years I served you and not once did I disobev vour orders; vet vou never gave me even a young goat to feast on with my friends. But when your son returns who swallowed up your property with prostitutes, for him you slaughter the fattened calf.' He said to him, 'My son, you are here with me always; everything I have is yours. But now we must celebrate and rejoice, because your brother was dead and has come to life again; he was lost and has been found."" This is the Gospel of the Lord.

ST. PERPETUA and ST. FELICITY (d.203), Martyrs

Their feast day is March 7. The martyrdom of Sts. Perpetua and Felicity is one of the most moving stories that followed the early persecution of the Church in Africa by the Emperor Severus. Perpetua was a noble young woman of twenty-two, the mother of a young child. Felicity was her servant, expecting a child to whom she gave birth in her imprisonment. Both were preparing for their baptism when they were arrested and confined to prison. Also arrested with them were three companions: Revocatus, Saturninus, and Secundulus. Perpetua's father, a pagan, urged his daughter to turn away from her faith and go free. Pointing to



one of the household utensils, she said to him, "Do you see this vase, father? Can it be anything else? Neither can I ever be anything but a Christian." Perpetua describes in her diary her first day in prison: "I never knew such darkness. What a day of horror. Terrible heat. Rough treatment from the soldiers. And I was so anxious for my baby! Finally, we were able to get a place in the better part of the prison and I was able to nurse my baby who was hungry." In a dream she saw a great golden ladder reaching up to heaven, and after being assured she could climb to the top, she saw a tall shepherd surrounded by thousands in white robes. The shepherd said to her, "Welcome, child!" Strengthened by her vision, Perpetua refused to renounce her faith when she was brought before her Roman judge. Perpetua and Felicity were condemned to die in the arena, consumed by wild beasts before a cheering crowd. During their imprisonment, they so impressed the officer in charge of the prison that he became a Christian, too. Their infants were taken care of by some Christian families, and the two young women walked calmly into the noisy amphitheater. Leopards, wild boars, and bears attacked, but they seemed to escape them unharmed. Calling out to some Christians who were looking on, Perpetua said, "Stand up for your faith and love one another. Don't let our-sufferings frighten you." Finally they were killed by the swords of gladiators. It was March 7, 203. Their prayer, Father, Your love gave Perpetua and Felicity the courage to suffer martyrdom. Amen.

THE DATE OF EASTER

In ancient Egypt, the Hebrews were kept as slaves, so God sent Moses to free them. When the ruler, Pharoah, would not let the Hebrews go, God punished Eygpt in many ways. He finally sent the Angel of Death to destroy the firstborn in each family, but first told the Hebrews to make a special lamb offering, and the angel would pass over their homes. This first Passover is commemorated each year by members of the Jewish faith, about March 21. For many years, Easter was celebrated at this same time because Jesus was crucified during Passover. In A.D. 325, a group of men meeting in Nicaea, a city in what is now Turkey, decided that Easter should be on a different day. They chose the Sunday following the first full moon after the vernal equinox. Vernal means "spring," and equinox means, "equal night." Thus, this is the one 24-hour period in the spring when both day and night lasts exactly twelve hours, usually March 21 or 22. Full moons, however, do not always come on the same date, so Easter may fall on any Sunday between March 21 and April 25. Sometimes it comes before Passover, and many Orthodox or Eastern Christians wait until Passover to celebrate Easter.

A reflection of faith & wisdom...CREATING SPACE FOR GOD Discipline is the other side of discipleship. Discipline without discipline is like waiting to run in the marathon without ever practicing.
