READING I - ex 34:4b-6, 8-9

Early in the morning Moses went up Mount Sinai as the LORD had commanded him, taking along the two stone tablets.

FEAST OF 'THE HOLY TRINITY'

THE MYSTERY...JUST A THOUGHT?

Consider these thoughts of theologian, Michael Downey, from Altogether Gift; A Trinitarian Spirituality.

Trinity Sunday, The Trinity, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, is a mystery of our faith. But what does that mean.? 11 ... real mystery is that which invites and allures us into fuller participation, all the while exceeding, our want to grasp it, contain it. Indeed, in much the same way, human love is a mystery. We are invited, at times allured, by another. Something in us is touched, moved, drawn by the other. The closer we come, and the more we grow in love, the clearer it becomes that the beloved cannot be tied down, grasped, defined once and for all...In this sense the Trinity is a mystery...it is not so much that we grasp the mystery but that we open ourselves so as to be grasped by it...God is love. God's word is spoken, God's spirit is poured forth. The life and love of God are not past tense, but present, ecstatic, alive, outreaching, gifting, here and now!"

ST. BARNABAS (first century) June 11

Enough not one of the twelve apostles chosen by Jesus, St. Barnabas played an important role in the mission of the apostles to the Gentile world. He was a Jew of the tribe of Levi and was born at Cyprus. His name was Joseph, but was changed to Barnabas by the apostles. He was one of the first converts to Christianity at Jerusalem after Pentecost. The Acts of the Apostles describes him as Barnabas, "the Son of Encouragement," who "sold a field which belonged to him and brought the money and laid it at the apostles' feet." "A good man, filled with the Holy Spirit and with faith," he was closely connected with St. Paul during his early missionary journeys and introduced him to the apostles. As a founder of the Church at Antioch, Barnabas invited Paul from Tarsus to help him form the new community of Christians. Then, inspired by the Holy Spirit, Paul and Barnabas journeved to other cities of Asia Minor, preaching the message of Jesus Christ.

The two apostles brought money from the Church of Antioch for the relief of famine victims in Judea. Barnabas and Paul also spoke at the Council of Jerusalem, describing the success of the Gospel among the Gentiles and winning approval for further journeys to the Gentile world.

The two apostles came to a disagreement in the course of their ministry over Barnabas' cousin, John Mark, and separated. Barnabas and John Mark went to Cyprus, and Paul went to Syria. Eventually, they were reunited. There is nothing we know for certain of Barnabas' later activity and death, but it is thought that he was stoned to death in 61 at Salamis.
