GOSPEL - Luke 14:25-33

Great crowds were traveling with Jesus, and he turned and addressed them, "If anyone comes to me without hating his father and mother, wife and children, brothers and sisters, and even his own life, he cannot be my disciple. Whoever does not carry his own cross and come after me cannot be my disciple. Which of you wishing to construct a tower does not first sit down and calculate the cost to see if there is enough for its completion? Otherwise, after laying the foundation and finding himself unable to finish the work the onlookers should laugh at him and say, 'This one began to build but did not have the resources to finish.' Or what king marching into battle would not first sit down and decide whether with ten thousand troops he can successfully oppose another king advancing upon him with twenty thousand troops? But if not, while he is still far away, he will send a delegation to ask for peace terms. In the same way, anyone of you who does not renounce all his possessions cannot be my disciple." This is the gospel of the Lord.

MARY - WOMAN OF FAITH

September 8th is celebrated as Mary's birthday, the Mother of God. Early September is a perfect time for all those Marys, the countless babies, children and women named Mary, to celebrate a names-day of their own. We do not know the exact date of Mary's birth. No words in Scripture refer to her birth. But that wonderful moment deserves commemoration because it marks the beginning in this world of a life precious to God for many reasons especially her extraordinary faith.

Christian tradition gives us Mary as the daughter of a devout Jewish couple in pre-First Century Jerusalem. Many hold that Anna and Joachim's home where Mary grew up was located near what is today the Church of St. Ann in Jerusalem. We know she grew up a devout and joyful woman of the Jewish faith and culture. In the first chapter of St. Luke's Gospel, hear Mary's confident and respectful exchange with the Archangel Gabriel. "Be it done unto me," says this grace filled teenage girl, accepting God's invitation to be the Mother of the Savior, "according to your word." Shortly after, we hear Mary's Song, the Magnificent. Filled with a deep familiarity and direct reference from Hebrew Scriptures, that joyful canticle shows Mary's heartfelt knowledge and use of prayer dating to centuries before her. She incorporates into her own song, the prayer attributed to Hannah, mother of the prophet Samuel, another great woman of faith. Accounts of Jesus birth and childhood give us insights into Mary's faith with words spoken and unspoken. At the Marriage Feast in Cana, we hear Mary's serene exchange with Jesus, her calm instruction to the stewards in charge of service at the wedding. "Do whatever he tells you." Mary clearly knows who her remarkable son is, has been, always will be. And she is clearly his herald. We know that Mary, apparently widowed, accompanies Jesus often in His ministry. She is one of his followers. She stands silent silhouette with so few others at the foot of His cross. Jesus' love and concern for her is so great that His last breath and strength in this world entrusts her care to the Apostle John. We expect that Mary's knowledge of Hebrew prayer and song came to the fore in that First Pentecost celebration. Scripture tells us that she was there, a woman of faith, an inspiration for the faith of others. Then and now. And not just for all those Mary's named in her honor down the centuries. Mary is the icon of faith for us all!
