They answered, "Moses permitted divorce and the writing of a decree of divorce." But Jesus told them: "He wrote that commandment for you because of your stubbornness. At the beginning of creation God made them male and female; for this reason a man shall leave his father and mother and the two shall become as one. They are no longer two but one flesh. Therefore let no man separate what God has joined." Back in the house again, the disciples began to question him about this. He told them, "Whoever divorces his wife and marries another commits adultery against her; the woman who divorces her husband and marries another commits adultery."

CELEBRATION OF THE FEAST OF ST. FRANCIS OF ASSISI

"Blessed are the pure in heart for they shall see God. Blessed are the peace-makers: for they shall be called the children of God. Blessed are they which are persecuted for righteousness' sake: for theirs is the kingdom of heaven."

ST. FRANCIS OF ASSISI, October 4

Francis was born in 1182 to a merchant couple who imported luxurious fabrics and sold them in Italy. His

parents thought Francis would also become a successful merchant. Instead, he decided to join the second crusade and had a fancy suit of armor made for himself. But on his first night out, he had a vision: the Lord was sending him back. He then faced the jeers of his neighbors, who thought him a coward. Francis, undeterred, turned away from war to peace and vowed he would await a further sign from God.

Francis then had a vision in which God told him to repair His church. Francis took this literally and with his own hands began to rebuild the church where he had been praying. But God meant a bigger church: Francis's mission was to help rebuild the whole faith.

Francis preached about humility, poverty, simplicity and prayer to everyone, even the birds, whom he thought of

as God's special creations. While others took up arms in the later crusades, Francis went to the Muslim leader with a message of peace. He attempted to express God's brotherhood by truly living by the Gospel. But his life of poverty and wandering, while good for his soul, was hard on his body. Although he died in 1226, the Order he founded, the Franciscan Friars, carries on his humble teachings in every corner of the globe.

HONORING THE BLESSINGS OF ST. FRANCIS

So often you hear, "there are no easy answers," but Francis never did anything the hardest way. He always looked for the simplest solution to every problem, believing that simplicity is one of the greatest virtues, one that helps lead to peace.

Francis's peacemaking abilities are the subject of legends, including one that has Francis making peace between a man-eating wolf and the village that was terrified of it. Perhaps that's just a legend, but there are simple things you can do to promote a peaceful life for yourself and your neighbors:

- Find time for solitary or family prayer every day, even if it's only a moment or two
- Try to reduce the amount of noise you make turn down the radio, speak more quietly, and avoid honking your horn.
- At least once a week, take a walk alone or with a family member to admire God's creations; this will serve as a reminder that every season—in fact, every day has so much beauty to offer.
