ST. GERTRUDE (1256-1301) November 16

St. Gertrude was born at Eisleben, Germany, in 1256. Nothing is known of her parents, and at the age of five she was put under the auspices of the Benedictine nuns at Helfta. Intelligent and studious, she quickly mastered languages, literature, and philosophy in her early years. She would also enter the Benedictine Order at Helfta and become a nun.

At the age of twenty-six, she experienced the first of a series of revelations of Christ. In the chapel, "where I was accustomed to make my lukewarm prayers, I heard these



words: 'I will save you and deliver you. Do not be afraid.'"' From then on, she had numerous revelations and experiences of God's grace, which she wrote about in the Book of Extraordinary Grace, an account of her spiritual journey. As she approached death, she wrote, "I am certain whether my death be sudden or foreseen, that I shall never be without the mercy of

God." Gertrude died at Helfta on November 17, 1301.
