ST. CECILIA, November 22

St. Cecilia, according to Roman legend, was a young patrician woman of Rome who was a Christian. She was filled with love for God to whom she vowed her life and virginity. Forced into marriage by her father, she sang to God on her wedding day, praying for help. Soon after, Valerian, her husband, and Tiburtius, his brother, were miraculously converted to Christianity by a vision and gave themselves to the care of the sick and the burial of the dead.

They were martyred at Pagus Triopus, outside of Rome, along with a Roman

official, Maximus, because they refused to sacrifice to the gods. Cecilia buried their bodies, and herself brought to trial for her beliefs. So persuasive was she that her accusers converted to Christianity. Finally, the perfect, Almachius, sentenced her to be suffocated in the heated bath of her home. Despite the intense heat she was unharmed, so a soldier was sent to behead her. She was struck on the neck three times and lingered for three days before dying. A tomb marking her grave is found in the cemetery of St. Callistus in Rome. St. Cecilia is the patron of musicians.

'THANK YOU' FOR THANKSGIVING!!!

The first Thanksgiving was in 1621, Plymouth, Massachusetts. William Bradford, the governor of the colony, set the time aside to give thanks for the bountiful harvest after the first hard year in the New World. In 1789, President Washington proclaimed November 26 Thanksgiving, but only the northern states celebrated it. Sarah Hale, a writer and editor, wrote letters to governors and presidents for 35 years, suggesting that Thanksgiving be made a national holiday. In 1864, President Lincoln so proclaimed the fourth Thursday in November. In 1939, President Roosevelt changed Thanksgiving Day from the fourth to the third Thursday in November. There was nationwide consternation;

Everywhere people were running around saying, "What? What??" By 1941, Thanksgiving was back where it belonged. In the place people were used to. In the place it should be!

There are many things to like about Thanksgiving Day. Many people like that it remains unspoiled and non-commercialized. Year after year, it is the same, pure holiday as always; time for families to gather to give thanks for their many blessings. (Even in the worst of years, there are always many blessings.) It is a kind of relief to have a holiday sanctioning our saying out loud that we're grateful for things in our lives. Enumerating our blessings gives a kind of cleansing lift we get from going to confession, but for the opposite reason, we feel great for saying out loud what's right in our lives.

No one has been able to tamper with the essential goodheartedness of Thanksgiving Day, or trivialize it, and probably no one ever will. For that alone, we can be grateful! Remember, 'Thanks for being YOU!'
