GOSPEL - John 1, 6-8. 19-28

A reading from the holy gospel according to St. John: R/: Glory be to you, O Lord.

There was a man named John sent by God, who came as a witness to testify to the light, so that through him all men might believe—but only to testify to the light, for he himself was the light.

The testimony John gave when the Jews sent priests and Levites from Jerusalem to ask "Who are you?" Was the absolute statement, "I am not the Messiah." They questioned him further, "Who then? Elijah?" "I am not Elijah," he answered. "Are you the prophet?" "No," he replied.

Finally they said to him: "Tell us who you are, so that we can give some answer to those who sent us. What do you have to say for your self?" He said, quoting the prophet Isaiah, "I am ' a voice in the desert, crying out: Make straight the way of the Lord!'"

Those whom the Pharisees had sent proceeded to question him further: "If you are not the Messiah, nor Elijah, nor the prophet, why do you baptize?" John answered them: "I baptize with water. There is one among you whom you do not recognize—the one who is to come after me—the strap of whose sandal I am not worthy to unfasten." This happened in Bethany, across the Jordan, where John was baptizing.

This is the gospel of the Lord. R/: Praise be to you, Lord Jesus Christ.

ADVENT - "Prepare Ye the Way of the Lord" ADVENT...

The word "ADVENT" is from the Latin adventus, meaning "the coming" of Jesus as His birth here on earth and also in His Second Coming.

The four weeks of Advent prepare us to celebrate the mystery of the Incarnation; God became human to bring us out of the darkness into His eternal light. During Advent, liturgy stresses not only penance, but also hope, light, joy and surrender.

THIRD SUNDAY OF ADVENT - JOY

Joy is the simplest form of gratitude. St. Paul said, "Rejoice in the Lord always; again I will say, Rejoice. Let your gentleness be known to everyone. The Lord is near. Do not worry about anything." (Philippians 4:4-5)

Called Gaudete from the Latin word meaning "rejoice," this Sunday's liturgy breaks from the somber mood of penance and reintroduces joy. We await the coming of the Lord with glad anticipation and try to be sensitive to the needs of others.

Mother Macrina, a 4th century mystic, was asked, "How does one acquire joy?" She answered, "You cannot acquire joy, you must find it." "And how do you find it?" She replied, "There is only one way to find it; to find joy, you must lose yourself."

Jesus explains that we will be judged by the way we love our neighbor: "Truly I tell you, just as you did it to one of the least of these who are members of My family you did it to Me." (Matthew 25:40)

Loving service is a way of life. Parents care for children, teachers for students, doctors and nurses for the sick. Only by being cheerful givers can we attain joy. Spiritual joy rises above injustice, inequality and prejudice. It can coexist with suffering, because it rises from the soul. While pleasure basically comes from the gratification of the senses, joy. comes from union with God.

ST. LUCY (d. 304) December 13

According to legend, St. Lucy was a young woman born at Syracuse, Italy. One day she went to the shrine of St. Agatha in Catania with her mother, who suffered from uncontrolled bleed-

ing. While praying at the shrine, Lucy's mother was cured. Lucy decided to give up her worldly goods to serve the poor, took a vow of virginity, and broke off her impending marriage to a young nobleman in order to give her life entirely to God.

Her suitor was incensed at her action and accused her before the Roman consul of being a Christian who would not honor the laws of the Empire.

Bravely confessing her faith, Lucy was sentenced to be tortured by fire and boiling oil. She was unmoved by the ordeal and showed no sign of weakness. "God has granted that I should bear these things in order to free the faithful from the fear of suffering," she said. Though a sword was thrust through

her throat, the young girl lived till communion was brought to her

for her final journey to heaven. She died during the persecution under Emperor Diocletian in 304.
