

THE FIRST CHRISTMAS...THE BIRTH OF JESUS

"Joseph went from the Galilean town of Nazareth up to Bethlehem in Judah, David's town, for the census. As a descendant of David, he had to go there. He went with, his fiancee, who was pregnant. While they were there, the time came for her to give birth. She gave birth to a son, her firstborn. She wrapped him in a blanket and laid him in a manger, because there was no room in a hostel." —Luke 2:4-7

THE CHRISTMAS CRIB OF ST. FRANCIS ...

It was St. Francis of Assisi, who first popularized the Christmas manger. St. Francis would use the most simple realities of daily life to teach the most profound doctrines. God's loving presence in the world, the sacredness of all living things. These have never been easy topics to talk about or teach.

Francis found readily available teaching aides to help himself and others to understand these truths, or at least to reverence the mystery they involved. He looked to the sun in the sky, to the animals of forest and the farm to lend a hand. And he did not hesitate to use song or poetry to make the lesson more palatable. His good sense and a natural talent for theatrics helped Francis bring home the meaning of the Incarnation, one of the central doctrines of the Christian Faith.

Francis knew that the ordinary people of the towns and villages would likely never journey to the Holy Land, as he had done. To visit Bethlehem, to come to understand the deeply human life lived by the Holy Family. People of the 12th and 13th century understood God and things divine as far removed from their lives. They saw Jesus and Mary and the saints depicted as royalty jewel-bedecked, powerful, and somewhat frightening. So one Christmas, Francis and his band of friars set about to bring the Holy Land experience of Christmas to the people around them. They gathered ordinary farm animals, real children and shepherds, and celebrated the birth of Christ with a kind of open-air tableau. In the reenactment of Christ's birth in the humble surroundings that people could identify with their own lives. God who became man in Bethlehem some 1100 years before, they began to understand, knew and experienced what they lived every day; cold in winter, rejection in poverty; joy in human family life and companionship.

So, this tradition grew. Miniature stables became a fixture in churches at Christmas time, and in homes. A tradition with us to this day. We need only observe even the smallest children, gathering with their families around the Creche after Christmas Mass. They understand, in their own way. This year, be sure to have a stable in your own home. Let it be a reminder that the simple faith that permits the child to know Jesus in the Christmas crib is what all of us should be looking for. "Be as little children."
