READING I - Acts 2:1-11

When the time for Pentecost was fulfilled, they were all in one place together. And suddenly there came from the sky a noise like a strong driving wind, and it filled the entire house in which they were. Then there appeared to them tongues as of fire, which parted and came to rest on each one of them. And they were all filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in different tongues, as the Spirit enabled them to proclaim.

Now there were devout Jews from every nation under heaven staying in Jerusalem. At this sound, they gathered in a large crowd, but they were confused because each one heard them speaking in his own language. They were astounded, and in amazement they asked, "Are not all these people who are speaking Galileans? Then how does each of us hear them in his native language? ST. BERNARDINO OF SIENA (1380-1444)

His feast day is May 20th. St. Bernardino of

Siena was born in Massa Marittima, Italy, in

1380 to a noble and wealthy family - his father was the governor of the town. Orphaned at the age of seven, Bernardino was raised by his aunt and her daughter. At the age of eleven, he was sent to be educated in Siena, and his intelligence and good disposition won him many friends. He joined the Confraternity of our Lady at the age of seventeen. In 1400 a plague struck Siena and Bernardino volunteered to help manage the hospital of Santa Maria della Scala. With the help of companions, he made sure that the sick were taken care of. Several of his companions died, and Bernardino was overcome by fever. In 1403, he entered the Franciscans and was ordained. He spent the next several years in solitude and reflection at the convent of Colombaio outside Siena. In 1417, he began to preach with increasing success throughout all of Italy. The crowds were so great that he often preached in village squares instead of churches. Pope Martin V offered him the bishopric of Siena in 1427, but Bernardino declined. He would later decline the bishoprics of Ferrara and Urbino. In 1430, he

became the vicar general of the Friars of the Strict Observance. In 1422, he resigned this office in order to continue his missionary work. Bernardino was devoted to the Holy Name of Jesus and inspired those to whom he spoke with a similar love. The Italy of his time was divided into many political factions, with each proclaiming its particular affiliation in signs and banners. Bernardino made people recall their common faith in Christ, which was more important than any other allegiance. Worn out from his labors, he died in Aquila on his way to preach in Naples on May 20, 1444. His prayer: Lord, we sing and bless your name. Before all peoples and at all times we remember you, for we bear the name of your Son, Jesus Christ. Amen.

HAIL MARY

The month of May is traditionally called the month of Mary in our Catholic tradition. Let us pray: Hail Mary, full of grace; the Lord is with Thee: blessed art Thou among women, and blessed is the fruit of Thy womb, Jesus. Holy Mary, Mother of God, pray for us, sinners, now and at the hour of our death. Amen.

OUR LADY OF LOURDES

In 1858, four years after the Immaculate Conception was proclaimed a dogma of Faith, Our Lady appeared to Bernadette Soubirous in the Grotto, Lourdes, France. Some say that this started the modern Age of Mary. She appeared as the "Lady in White", prayed the rosary with Bernadette and in conversations with Bernadette repeated what her Son called for when he walked the earth: prayers, penance, conversion of sinners; and said her name:

"I am the Immaculate Conception." Since then, Lourdes has been a spiritual dynamo radiating holiness and goodness throughout the world. Thousands benefit every year from a pilgrimage to Lourdes. Many were cured of various illnesses right there in Lourdes. The daily caring of the sick by charitable volunteers is in itself a miracle. Bernadette herself was canonized in 1933. A prayer to Our Lady, Beloved Mother of God, we thank you for your coming to Lourdes. In our hearts it is a sign that you and all of heaven are not far from us. You showed your face to the little girl at Lourdes 150 years ago. Our remembrance of this lifts us up when we are dejected or dismayed. In faith we know that your Son and you will be with us until the end of the world. Amen.
