ST. GREGORY THE GREAT, c. 540-604 "The chants that enchant the soul."

His feast day is September 3rd. Gregory, was from a wealthy family that had already produced two popes. Though he was honest and successful public servant and one of the richest in Rome, he gave up his position of prominence to devote his life to God. In 575, he converted his home into a monastery under the patronage of St. Andrew and the guidance of the monk, Valentius. He became a monk himself and established six more monasteries in Sicily. After the death Pope Pelagius II from the plague in 590, Gregory was elected to the papacy, the first monk to be so honored. As head of the church he sent the great St. Augustine to bring the Gospel to England. He was a man of many interests and humane sensibilities in an age when peace and compassion were in short supply. Throughout his fourteen- year reign, Gregory wrote sermons, letters, biographies of the saints, and songs and hymns, and he put his weight behind reforming the liturgy. In time, his name would be synonymous with the magnificent stylistic chant - Gregorian chant - one of the greatest forms of sacred music in the Catholic Church. When Gregory died in Rome, the Roman people, true to form and loyal to the man they loved, acclaimed him a saint immediately. His prayer, Gregory, you called yourself the "servant of the servants of God," a title that every pope since you used. Help me find true value in serving others, even those who are servants. I pray for the humility to place myself under others and serve for higher motives than prestige or recognition for the work I do. Amen.

Case in point; the thousands who visit the famed Shrine of Lourdes each year. Many come away "healed in spirit" if not "cured" of bodily ills. These remarkable people, often labeled "hopeless cases," find spiritual refreshment as they depart their pilgrimage and return home. As their cases are regarded as an "uphill battle all the way," even family members are amazed at the new found peace, and the wider perspective on life such pilgrims discover in the experience of holy sites. This season, in the midst of blooms, children's laughter, and life so truly in abundance, find time to pray for those who approach the final threshold of death. And know that you have a friend in Jude, the First Century Apostle and Martyr. Renowned over the centuries as the "saint of hopeless cases," his example can buttress your faith and that of the dying. Pray that they may take courage and benefit from the intercession of St. Jude on their behalf.
