Can any of you by worrying add a single moment to your life-span? Why are you anxious about clothes? Learn from the way the wild flowers grow. They do not work or spin. But I tell you that not even Solomon in all his splendor was clothed like one of them. If God so clothes the grass of the field, which grows today and is thrown into the oven tomorrow, will he not much more provide for you, O you of little faith? So do not worry and say, 'What are we to eat?' or 'What are we to drink?' or 'What are we to wear?' All these things the pagans seek. Your heavenly Father knows that you need them all. But seek first the kingdom of God and his righteousness, and all these things will be given you besides. Do not worry about tomorrow; tomorrow will take care of itself. 

SEASON OF LENT

Our Lord, Jesus Christ, directly after his baptism, prepared Himself for His public life and mission by a fast of forty days in the desert, which extends from Jericho to the mountains of Judea. Let us prepare ourselves by fast, prayers and works of charity for the solemn Feast of Easter.

ASH WEDNESDAY - March 1st

This day opens the liturgical season of Lent. In Old Law ashes were generally a symbolic expression of grief, mourning or repentance. In the Early Church the use of ashes had a like signification and with a sackcloth formed part of the public penances. The blessing of the ashes is one of the great liturgical rites of the year. It was originally instituted for public pennants, but is now intended for all Christians, as Lent should be a time of penance for all. The ashes used this day are obtained by burning the palms of the previous year. Four ancient prayers are used in blessing them; having sprinkled them with holy water and incensed them, the priest puts them on the foreheads of the faithful with the words; "Remember man, that thou art dust, and unto dust thou shall return."

Ash Wednesday, Mass and Distribution of Ashes will be held on Wednesday, March 1st, at 7 p.m.

For Catholic Christians, we embark on just such a renewal plan for mind and soul (as well as body) beginning with the Sign of the Cross on our foreheads, an age-old symbol painted in ashes. Keeping the days of Lent, we trim away the fat of spiritual sloth...the laziness of spirit that comes with letting prayer slide down the list of our priorities. Among the best plans of action, the sure fire step by step program: Fill our minds with good Spiritual reading. And as Christians, we are blessed with more material than we can ever use. A library of spiritual books, tapes, and videos. Our Diocesan newspaper, Catholic magazines, television shows, local regional and national, offer a diet of good reading, offering the experience of other believers living lives much like our own. And there are the classics; lives of the saints, people of faith who have gone before us, people we discover to be not so unlike ourselves. And the classics of classics; Holy Scripture, God's holy Word. Especially the Gospels, speaking to us loud and clear, even today, with the words and teachings of Jesus, the Lord. Lent invites us to spiritual renewal. Make time in this holy season to support that goal with solid spiritual reading!
