PRESENTATION OF JESUS, February 2nd

Forty days after his birth, Jesus was presented in the temple by Mary and Joseph to fulfill Jewish law. 'There he was recognized by Simeon and Anna, who were waiting for the coming Messiah. St. Lulce reports the event; When the day came to purify them according to the law of Moses, the couple brought Jesus up to Jerusalem so that he

could De presented to the Lord, for it is written in the law of the Lord, "everv first born male shall be consecrated to the Lord." They came to offer in sacrifice "a pair of turtledoves or two young pigeons," in accord with the dictate in the law of the Lord. 'There lived in Jerusalem at the time a certain man named Simeon. He was just and pious, and awaited the consolation of Israel, and the Holy Spirit was upon him. It was revealed to him by the Holy Spirit that he would not experience death until he had seen the Annointed of the



Lord. He came to the temple now, inspired by the Spirit; and when the parents brought in the child Jesus to perform for him the customary ritual of the law, he took him in his arms and blessed God in these words: "Now, Master, you can dismiss your servant in peace; you have fulfilled your word. For my eyes have witnessed your saving deed displayed for all the peoples to see: A revealing light to the Gentiles, the glory of your people Israel." This feast celebrated by the Christian Churches of East and West at an early date, has also been called "Candlemas Day" because candles are blessed and lighted this day on which Simeon called Jesus "a light to the Gentiles."



FEAST OF CANDLEMAS - February 2nd

It is perhaps the most ancient festival of Our Lady. It nonors the Presentation of Our Lord in the Temple, and the meeting of the Infant Jesus with the old man Simeon with joy and recognition. Traditionally the blessing and distribution of candles is held, being a symbolic presen-

tation of the truth proclaimed in the Canticle of Simeon; "Our Lord is the "Light for the Revelation of the Gentiles." 'This feast concludes the Christmas Season, after the Epiphany.

CANDLES OF THIS DAY

Candles blessed in church, this day, are taken home as a symbol of the Blessed Mother. They are called thunder candles. The candle is lit during thunderstorms, to protect the home from lighting. It is also lit during times of troubles or when someone is approaching death. The legend surrounding these candles is that the evening the Blessed Mother wards off wolves by using these candles as a torch. Historically, there are many art works which portray the Blessed Mother in this theme. May God bless and keep us, always!

ST. BLAISE (d.316) February 3rd

There is no accurate historical evidence about St. Blaise's life. He was born into a wealthy family and received a Christian education. He was appointed Bisnop of Sebaste in Armenia and was martyed dur-

ing the persecution of Licinius by Agricolaus, Governor of Cappadocia and Lower Armenia, in 316. According to tradition, Blaise retreated to a cave and became a hermit during the persecution of Licinius. While there, he befriended wild animals and cared for them when they were wounded or sick. One day, hunters found Blaise in the woods surrounded by wild animals. They captured him with the intention of putting him in prison. On the way to Sabaste, Blaise encountered a woman whose little boy was choking to death on a fishbone. Blaise healed him and the blessing of throats on this day derives from this story. Blaise was then delivered to Governor Agricolaus and beheaded. His prayer: Through the intercession of St. Blaise may God deliver us from all evils of the throat and from every other evil. Amen.
